Water for Life A Review of Helping Hugs' Water Projects by Robert Hochwald, President, Helping Hugs, Inc.

Water is basic to life. For those in Haiti it is a daily struggle to first find a source of water and then haul that water back to their home. For many, that source of water is the nearest stream or river. For others it may be rain water collected in a cistern at home or at their local parish. Unfortunately, Haiti is currently experiencing a severe drought leaving the streams, rivers and cisterns dry. Haiti frequently goes through cycles of wet and dry periods except, this year, the rainy season was not wet at all.

If finding water was not in itself a difficult problem, consider that most of the water is not fit to drink. The results are illnesses that we do not experience here in the US. Water borne diseases are a major health issue in Haiti. Many areas of Haiti are currently experiencing Cholera outbreaks. Other illnesses attributed to contaminated water are E.Coli, Typhoid, Hepatitis A,B,E, Salmonella Typhi, Meningitis, Worms, Amebic Dysentery and more. While many NGO's in Haiti are working to combat this problem, there is much ground to cover. Helping Hugs' medical team recognized this problem early in their visits to Côtes-de-Fer and reported back to our organization. That is why, in 2016, we undertook and completed our first water project, for the St. Joseph Parish and the community of Cotes-de-Fer. Helping Hugs, Inc. funded the project which was built by World Water Relief, a water purification company founded by Dr. Kevin Fussell, a local practicing physician. The system uses a government supplied source of water, which is not safe to drink, and through a series of filters renders it potable. It is then stored in large tanks and distributed on a schedule to those in need. Our medical team has indicated that they have seen a decrease of medical issues related to clean water in this area.

Last year we identified a new area which needed our assistance to provide a source of clean potable water to that area. Mayette had a well but could not afford to purchase a pump to make water available. We agreed to undertake a project to provide the needed pump and build a purification and storage system so that the water would be available and safe to drink. Mayette frequently experiences outbreaks of Cholera especially during the rainy season. It is our expectation that the project will result in a reduction of health issues for the area as well as supply that community with a much needed reliable source of water. The project was completed the end of August 2018.



"Merci Seigneur" (Thank you God") was the reaction of the parishioners of St. Matthias chapel when the pure water flowed, August 27th. These people have been working toward this day for many years. Thanks to our partner, World Water Relief, we were able to provide water on the main street of the village for the community and behind the chapel for children's hand washing.



While we are pleased with our accomplishments to date, we still have work to do. Our school children also need a clean safe source of water to keep them healthy and in school. We have authorized Father Islaire to purchase a small water purifying system, manufactured by LifeStraw, for one of the schools. This system will supply enough water for drinking Hope for Haiti, and cooking. another U.S. organization providing help in the area, is also helping bring clean water to the schools and will be providing equipment over the next year for two schools.

We are currently investigating the feasibility and cost of drilling a well near the church and rectory in Cotes-de-Fer. This would allow us to provide a larger volume of water to feed to our purification system there. The government water source has been erratic during the drought and there is always a fee for the water used. A well would eliminate the cost as well as interruptions in the water supply.

On behalf of the public, I thank the donors and the members of HH for this precious gift made at the chapel of Mayette. Thanks to you and your generosity, the poor people of Mayette can avoid getting sick, because they now have access to drinking water.

The renovations to the parish hall this year have required us to make changes to our **"Fête For Haiti"** dinner/auction fundraiser.

We believe we have acquired a great venue for this year's event. **Bennie's Red Barn** has agreed to host our event on **Friday, November 9th**. Tickets will be \$60.

Attendees will have their choice of Steak (T-Bone or Filet) or Seafood Platter (Fried or Broiled). Dinner will include a Baked Potato or French Fries, Salad, Rolls, and a Beverage (Water, Iced Tea, Soft Drink or Coffee).
