## **Medical Team Sees a Record Number of Patients**

**A Medical Mission Report**

Grateful patients, at four locations of our twin parish, received the services of our fifth medical mission from April 4th through 8th. Although the trip had been delayed because of unrest throughout Haiti, both the travel and the transportation of nine suitcases of medications and supplies, went flawlessly.

Because the team arrived early in **Côtes-de-Fer** on April 4th, they were able to see **67 patients** before darkness interrupted their work. Diane Smith, team leader, reported, "Although this was an unscheduled clinic, word spread quickly." A poor, elderly woman walked up the hill to the school to be seen. Before Father Faustin drove her home in the dark, he served her a plate of food which she consumed with gratitude. He said that it was probably the first meal she had eaten in days.

At **St. Lawrence chapel**, the life of a baby with pneumonia was undoubtedly saved because of a donated battery-operated nebulizer from Rainbow Drug Store and medicine from MAP International and Blessings International. The team saw **150 patients** on Friday.

The next day, at **St. Matthias chapel,** two very serious incidents were reported. The first was a woman with hypertension who had to be medicated immediately and observed for several hours. She was helped home by a relative. A second woman had been kicked by a donkey five weeks ago and had a very bad infection. She was referred to a hospital and helped home by her granddaughter. The team saw 1**70 patients** on Saturday.

Sunday morning, the day started with mass. At right, the team gathers with translators and Father Faustin for a photo of remembrance.

Father had a special request of the team that day. He asked them to speak with the teens to teach them about hygiene and answer their questions. Boys and girls met with team members in separate groups. Some of them attended the clinic later that day in **Côtes-de-Fer.** One hundred ninety (190) patents were seen on Sunday.





The final day of clinic was held at St. Mother Teresa chapel and 192 patients were seen. The extraordinary encounter this day was with four children with chickenpox. Another child was very ill. The local doctor who joined the team for four days, suspected it was typhoid fever.

Throughout the week, the team engaged in teaching about clean water, careful bathing (not sitting in the river) and hypertension.

**Something new** is being added to the medical mission agenda. Starting this year, **a nurse will be hired** to check blood pressures on patients who have been treated by the medical team and to re-supply blood pressure medications. Sufficient medications were left for the remainder of the year. The nurse will serve patients at five chapels as well as those at St. Joseph church.

Kevin brings the shipping process into the 21st century by entering the data in a spreadsheet. Weights and costs are calculated instantaneously! And thanks to a translation app on her phone, Mary Lynch translates the contents of each box into Haitian Creole for ease of distribution in Haiti.





By the end of Day #4, Bill gets a pat on the back for a job well done. All 50 boxes have been packed to perfection on three pallets. It was puzzling to make them fit on the pallets because boxes of different sizes had to be used. Thank you Bill, Bill, Diane, Dick and Kevin for all the work putting this shipment together.

By the end of Day #5, the prettiest little "warehouse" in Sea Palms is ready for the trucking company to take the shipment to Nashville where it will be added to a sea container for shipment to Haiti.

This is the largest shipment you have sent to our twin parish - 2,046 pounds! Thank you!
